Our student population increased to 300 enrollments during the course of the year. We believe this increase was mostly due to our commitment to service as the best advertising of all, "word of mouth," spread throughout Tuscarawas and surrounding counties.

We continue to revise our technical environment and curriculum to better meet the needs of our students. Our teachers work diligently to provide as much individual attention as possible and to guide students through the curriculum. The challenges are many, but we continue to maintain our focus on enhancing our services as we continue to grow and improve our program.

We are focusing on several areas for the 2007-2008 school year. We are providing additional support for students who are in jeopardy of not succeeding in QDA and thus, may opt out of school all together. This includes support and programs to parents. Third, we continue to train teachers in rigorous, cutting edge, web-based instruction and delivery methods to better serve our students. And fourth, we are currently in the process of developing, writing, and implementing our own online curriculum.

SPECIAL NEEDS STUDENTS

Students with disabilities or special needs may enroll in QDA. However a Special Education team will meet with each individual student and parent to review all records to verify that we can indeed fairly and properly service the student and to determine if the digital academy is the child's least restrictive environment. Each child will work with regular education teachers as well as a special needs teacher in his/her age-appropriate grade level. The child's needs will be met according to the Individualized Education Plan/IEP. Service options may include regular classes without modifications after a consultation with a special needs teacher; regular class with modifications from a special needs teacher; individualized classes with part regular education classes; or individualized classes. Students with disabilities receive consultative services from the special education teacher on a weekly basis. These services can include a combination of the following: email correspondence, phone conferences, or weekly meetings. Students also have the opportunity to work in the computer lab in New Philadelphia when the special education teacher is on site for extra assistance. If a child is having difficulty, the parent or teacher may ask for a meeting with the IEP team to discuss the needs of the child and develop a plan of intervention.



If a child is having difficulty and is not currently identified as a student with disabilities, the parent or teacher may ask for a meeting with the Intervention Assistance Team (IAT). The IAT will meet to discuss the needs of the child, identify the problem and develop a plan of intervention. Parents also have the right to request an evaluation to determine if their child qualifies for special education services and supports as defined by the Operating Standards for Ohio's Schools Serving Students with Disabilities.

During the 2006-07 school year, QDA serviced 15 children on IEP's. Of those 15, 11 students had Specific Learning Disabilities, 3 were identified as Other Health Impaired and 1 student was recognized with a Cognitive Disability. One student was evaluated and placed on their initial IEP, while participating in QDA. Short-cycle assessments were also completed on a quarterly basis to track students' skills in the areas of reading and math.

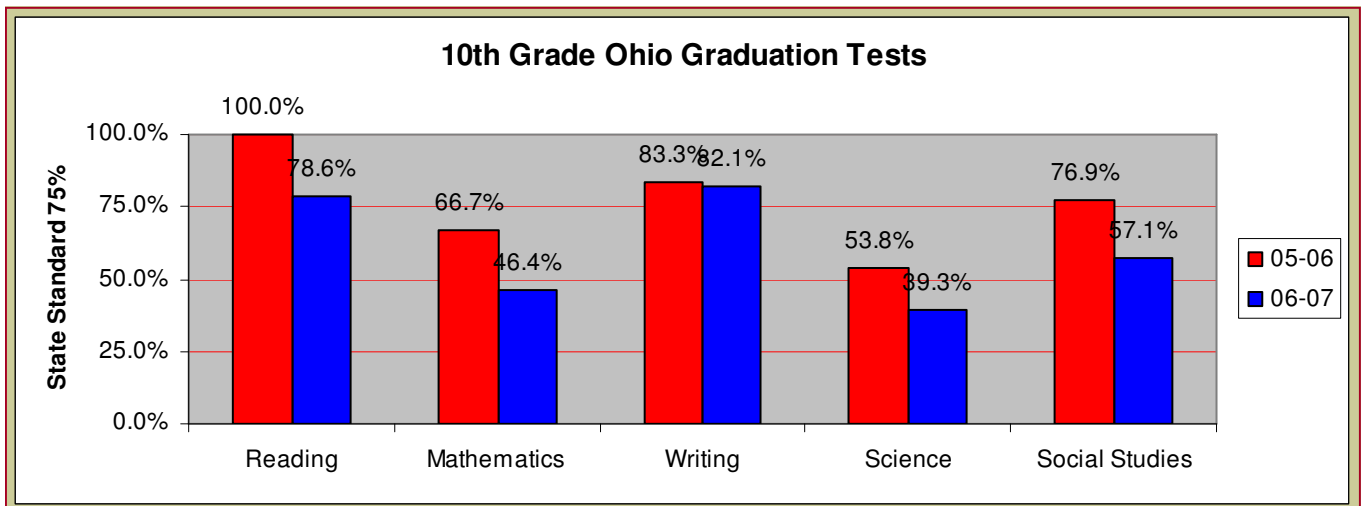

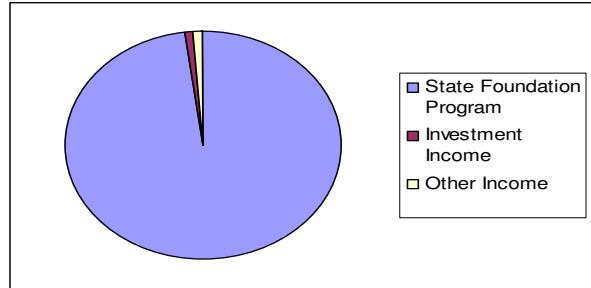

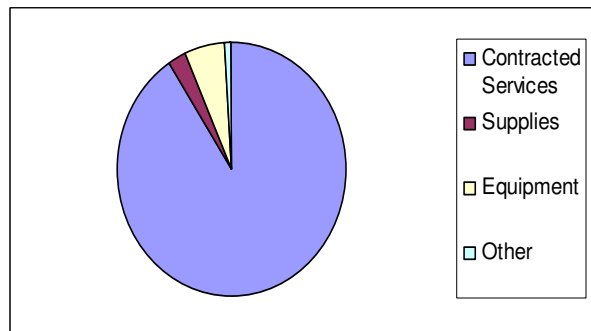
