Curriculum

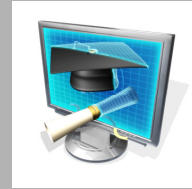

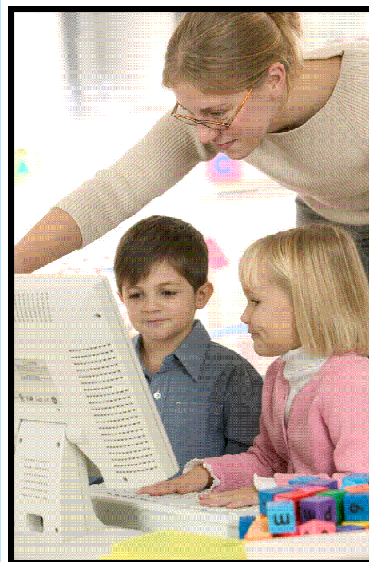

SPECIAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Students with disabilities or special needs may enroll in QDA. However a Special Education team will meet with each individual student and parent to review all records to verify that we can indeed fairly and properly service the student. Each child will work with a regular education teacher as well as a special needs teacher in his/her age-appropriate grade level. Each child's needs will be met according to the Individualized Education Plan/IEP.

Service options may include regular classes without modifications after a consultation with a special needs teacher; regular class with modifications from a special needs teacher; individualized classes with part regular education classes; or individualized classes. Students with disabilities receive consultative services from the special education teacher on a weekly basis. These services can include a combination of the following: email correspondence, phone conferences, or weekly meetings. Students also have the opportunity to work in the QDA computer lab, when the special education teacher is on sight for extra assistance. If a child is having difficulty, the parent or teacher may ask for a meeting with the IEP team to discuss the needs of the child and develop a plan of intervention.

If a child is having difficulty and is not currently identified as a student with disabilities, the parent or teacher may ask for a meeting with the Intervention Assistance Team (IAT). The IAT will meet to discuss the needs of the child, identify the problem and develop a plan of intervention. Parents also have the right to request an evaluation to determine if their child qualifies for special education services and supports as defined by the Ohio Educational Agencies serving Children with Disabilities.

In May 2008, seventeen students enrolled in QDA were receiving special education services. Of those seventeen, eleven students were identified as having Specific Learning Disabilities, three were Other Health Impaired, two students were Emotionally Disturbed, and one student had Cognitive Disabilities. One student was evaluated, but was not eligible for special education services.

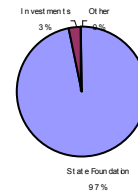

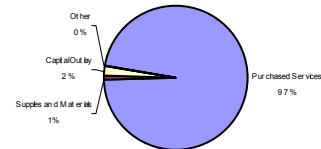

Reaching her dream . . .

One of QDA's recent graduates came to New Philadelphia from Mexico. Like many immigrant families, they came to our nation to start a new life with dreams of the future. She and her sisters enrolled in our middle school, music and band. At a skating party, she fell and required a doctor's attention. It was then discovered that she had severe kidney failure. This began a hard time for her and her family. Teachers and classmates gathered to lend a hand. Mom and dad both work and have only one car. Because she required kidney dialysis treatment in Akron three times a week, many community members and school staff donated gas money, provided transportation and assistance for the family. However, attending school became too much for her physically. She enrolled in Quaker Digital Academy to receive a home-based education, sponsored by our school district. We are proud to announce that this fine young lady has completed all of her requirements for graduation, and although she is now 21 years of age, a major goal in her life has been accomplished.
